## February et al

February this year has five Sundays – a rare occurrence if my calculations are correct. This occurs on a twenty eight year cycle except when the hundreds are not a leap year when the interval is 40 years. Thus the last time it occurred was 1976 and the next will be 2032 so we shall not have to invoke the Chalke Valley fifth Sunday routine in February until then. As a student of hagiology I can find no Saints whose festival occurs on 29<sup>th</sup> February. That's the end of the Mathematics and History lesson – now to February.....

February 2<sup>nd</sup> is the principal feast of the ***Presentation of Christ in the Temple***. This day marks the completion of forty days since the birth of Jesus, when Mary and Joseph took the child to the Temple in Jerusalem. The requirement in Levitical law was for Mary to be 'cleansed', the completion of her purification following the birth of a male child. Until that day, she could touch no holy thing, not enter the sanctuary. Yet on seeing the holy family, Simeon praised God and acclaimed the infant as '*the light to enlighten the nations*' and the prophet Anna gave thanks and proclaimed him her Redeemer. The image of Christ as the Light has led to the celebration of light countering darkness with beeswax candles being blessed, distributed and carried in procession – giving this day its name – ***Candlemas***.

***Ash Wednesday*** this year falls on 25<sup>th</sup> February when we begin our Lenten discipline. Discipline is a sadly neglected word in this modern day and age, but to be a true Christian, we must become a *disciple* of Christ and we must accept His *discipl-ine* not only during Lent but throughout our lives.

February 27<sup>th</sup> marks the Lesser Festival of ***George Herbert, Priest***. George Herbert was born in 1593 into the Pembroke family of Wilton and he went up to Cambridge in 1614, eventually becoming a fellow of Trinity College. At the age of twenty-five, he became Public Orator in the University and then a Member of Parliament, apparently destined for a life at court. To everyone's surprise he decided to be ordained and, after spending a time with his friend Nicholas Ferrar at Little Gidding, he was made Deacon in 1626. He married in 1629 – was priested in 1630 and given the cure of souls of Saint Andrew's, Bemerton, where he spent the rest of his short life. He wrote prolifically, his many hymns still being very popular throughout the English-speaking world. His treatise, *The Country Parson*, on the priestly life, and his poetry, especially *The Temple*, earned George Herbert a leading place in English literature. He never neglected the care of the souls of Bemerton, however, and encouraged attendance at the weekday recitation of the daily office, calling to mind the words of his hymn, '*Seven whole days, not one in seven, I will praise thee*' He died on 27<sup>th</sup> February 1633, aged just 40 years

## **How much do you care about rights of way in your countryside ?**

Since the Countryside & Rights of Way Act 2000 came into law many lovers of the quality of our paths and byways have been concerned about the increase of damage caused by the use and over-use of motorised vehicles. Much of the damage is due to the ill-conceived CROW Act and has reached a state where ancient tracks of all types have become impassable on foot, horseback and even by off-road vehicles themselves. Indigenous plants and wildlife are disturbed and threatened with extinction. Peaceful walks are now at hazard from organised off-road groups, lone vehicles and trail bikes.

The government has decided that the time has come not only to curb the over-use of motor vehicles on rights of way but to prevent the increase of byways open to all traffic by modification of paths using outdated laws based on the principle of "once a carriageway – always a carriageway." The Minister of Rural Affairs, Alun Michael, has issued a consultation paper that aims to repeal parts of the CROW Act and make other legislative changes relevant to this important subject.

The consultation period will end on 19<sup>th</sup> March 2004 and up to that date members of the public, farmers, land owners, walkers, riders on horseback or vehicles, in fact anyone with an interest in the quality of our countryside, etc, have the right to respond to the paper titled "The use of mechanically propelled vehicles on rights of way". Its thirty pages are no different to most legal communications – they can be difficult to understand. The response is now more difficult because the paper has not been distributed at the outset other than to Highway authorities and user groups – but not directly to local councils or rural populations.

The South Wiltshire Rights of Way Preservation Group, which has campaigned against the CROW Act since the consultation in 1998 that created it, has sought the co-operation of parish councils in the south of the county in order to conduct open meetings to achieve two aims. First, we want to ensure that electors in parishes are aware of the facts in the consultation and second that they can be given an open choice document to use in response to the seven DEFRA proposals.
