Easter

Easter eggs, fluffy yellow chicks, little lambs, baby rabbits, spring flowers ... well, you couldn't sell Easter commercially with Christian imagery. And we do share a similar timing with the Spring Equinox, and link in strongly with the traditional springtime celebrations of new life. It's a bit like Christmas, its timing taken from a pagan winter festival, when we usually find robins and snow scenes taking precedence over the crib.

Should we shy away from all the secular symbolism in order to reinforce the message of the cross? Perhaps the answer is not as simple as we may first think. What might Jesus say if we were to ask him how we should go about celebrating Easter in our secular world?

Most often his answers to questions took the form of stories, parables, or challenges which left his listeners with answers they must work out for themselves. And these stories and challenges were more about love and new life than about suffering. Even taking up the cross was about loving selflessly and with complete integrity, following the way of God. And the new life that came from it transforms our understanding of all suffering.

It was not Jesus' way to answer questions with tightly defined doctrinal statements, or to distance himself from the pleasures that are part of everyday life. Instead his life and his stories taught us about the greater joy and freedom to be found by living fully in God's love and forgiveness. But he did give us one firm commandment, that we should love one another; and a commission to make this love known. That's been part of this year's York Lent course – the mission of the church summed up in commandment and commission.

So let us start where people are. Let's start with enjoyment of Easter eggs, and lovingly show the world the fuller joy to be found by trusting in God's love. 'Dear Lord, three things I pray, to see Thee more clearly, love Thee more dearly, follow Thee more nearly, day by day.'
