# Odstock, Nunton and Bodenham W.I.

Our President welcomed everyone back after their summer break for the September meeting and explained that next month's meeting will include a sale of Winter clothes and Bric-a-brac, a speaker on Reiki and Crystals, and the autumn Lunch. Other events for September include the lunch club going to Barford, the walking group going to Wilton & the 5<sup>th</sup> Monday Needle-felting group meeting that includes a shared lunch.

We had an informing report on our Local River watch team who monitor the Ebble weekly and then an interesting, illustrated talk by popular Ron Taylor, titled "Go with the Flow". He told of his journey through to Southampton waters, Broadlands to Spit head.

He started by telling us that the big cruise ships don't now leave from Southampton water but the River Test! The Titanic left from Southampton docks, towed into the Test, and the new terminal opened in 2009 where the cruise liners leave from today. Southampton water is actually a drowned valley 3000 years old.

He then described Broadlands and all its Royal honeymooners; Lord Mountbatten's murder in 1979; the famous monuments of Lord Palmerston and Florence Nightingale; and the wonderful outdoor concerts at Broadlands. He moved on to Wolfe T microbrewery and then the ancient Redbridge and Eling Creek with its tidal mill producing delicious home milled bread and the Royal Pier that had a disastrous fire in 1983. He mentioned Esso Fawley and Cowes, and the IOW home of the Hovercraft. He finally returned across the Solent to Spit Head where the Battle of Agincourt took place in 1797 and finished with references to the Spit head Reviews which ended in 2005, "No money no ship".

Ron was gratefully thanked for another enjoyable talk, which ended a happy morning.

# River Ebble Water Quality

# Caution!

Recent bacteriological testing (27th August 2025) has shown that this river is significantly contaminated. with E. Coli and intestinal enterococcus

You are advised not to bathe in the river until further notice.

You may have noticed the above sign at Jubilee Gardens in early September. This was posted as a result of work by the River Ebble Water Quality Monitoring Group, a small team of local "Citizen Scientists", supported by your Parish Council, who have been regularly testing the river water for the past year. Nearly all of our previous tests have returned satisfactory results, but a bacteriology test taken over the Bank Holiday weekend at the end of August showed worryingly high levels of bacterial contamination. According to the Environment Agency's criteria the river must be considered unsafe for bathing until further notice.

We believe that this problem is a result of the very low level of water in the river and that it will resolve as the water level rises in the coming weeks.

We will be repeating the test in September and hope to be able to report that the problem is resolved but until then you are advised to **keep out of the river**.

STOP PRESS - the result from the test taken on 15 Sept shows that the river remains significantly contaminated and bathing is not advised.

# Fond Farewells and Grateful Thanks

After an incredible combined 34 years of dedicated service, Odstock Parish Council is bidding a fond (and slightly reluctant) farewell to two of its longest-serving members.

Since 1991, Colin has been a familiar and reliable presence at the council table, steering everything from pavement planning to bridge building with a signature mix of pragmatism, persistence, and dry wit.

Originally seconded onto the council by family friend Ron Ireland, Colin was, at the time, considered the youthful injection the council needed—reportedly dragging the average age down to a sprightly 79. Now, decades later, he steps away with good humour, suggesting his departure may well have the opposite effect.

In his three-decade-plus tenure, Colin has left an impressive legacy. Among his proudest achievements is the footpath linking Nunton and Odstock—minus the school section, credit for which he graciously hands to Nigel. He also spent many years (and likely countless emails) liaising with Highways to push for resurfacing along the same route. With the final section due imminently, he has passed the baton—and the task of continued gentle badgering—to his successor, Shaun.

One of Colin's favourite community projects was the construction of the charming wooden bridge at Jubilee Gardens in 1999, a real family affair involving his wife's family, the Fords. Designed by his father-in-law, Peter, and built with their combined efforts, it still stands strong today thanks to a few well-timed repairs—and, no doubt, some TLC. There are countless other smaller projects Colin has helped with over the years, and he has been a steady hand and local champion throughout. His humour, wisdom, and dedication will be greatly missed.


Colin, thank you for your many years of tireless service—and for proving that you really can get things done, even with a bit of fun along the way.

Our second farewell is for Sally, who is stepping down after 11 years of dedicated service. # Speeding through the village



How often have you heard complaints about the speed of some cars passing through our villages? Fortunately, there have been no serious incidents in recent years but with the Nursery at Odstock, the Orchard Sheltered Accommodation and The Radnor Arms in Nunton together with several tight corners there is a constant risk of accident and injury particularly to pedestrians and cyclists. The Community Speed Watch Team (CSW team) was established to deter drivers from speeding through our community. We are supported and overseen by Wiltshire Police who provide our Speed Camera and other kit and to whom we report. We hold sessions regularly for one week each month. We usually work in a group of 3 or 4 and record the speed of every passing vehicle during a 50min session. The VRN, speed and time of any vehicle traveling in excess of the limit are reported and these reports are followed up by the Police.

Although we still see a lot of cars speeding, the Speed Indicator Device (SID) data shows that overall, nearly 95% of vehicles do keep to the 30mph limit and less than 1% are recorded as exceeding 35mph. The SID was funded by our Parish Council. We believe that our presence, reinforced by the SID, has had a significant impact in reducing the speed of vehicles passing through the villages. CSW teams today typically "catch" one or two speeding cars per session whereas in the early days it was normal to record 6 or more offenders. The recent numbers quoted above are some of the best recorded in data shared with Wiltshire Police by CSW teams throughout Wiltshire.

Volunteers usually undertake a couple of 50min sessions once a month. We are a small team and would welcome some new members, if you are concerned about the problem and can spare a couple of hours a month, we would welcome a few new members.

# Spotlight on Dan and Delia

In contrast to our previous spotlight articles about a prominent local person, this month we are focusing on a couple who live on the other side of the world. If you were in the panto audience a few years ago, you may remember seeing our two friends Dan and Delia Richter performing on stage in Robin Hood. An actor and a vet, they were a great asset to the Radnor Hall Players, not only from being a lot of fun and brilliant actors, but also for supplying any number of props thanks to Dan's profession as Art Director in TV and Film. Sadly for us they decided last year to leave their home of 7years in Nunton and emigrate to Singapore. We caught up with them recently when they briefly returned for a holiday.

Ed: What attracted you to Singapore and why do you love it so much?

**Delia**: Weirdly Dan and I had both been in Singapore at the same time in 1995, but that was 20years before we met! I was a vet student at Singapore Zoo and Dan was in a theatre company performing Shakespeare. We visited again, as a couple this time, for a 4days stop over on a trip "Down Under" to meet each other's families and friends. We loved it, so two years ago we decided to go there on holiday and we just had a wonderful time. I discovered that I could easily find work there as a vet, so we started thinking more seriously....... And then took the plunge!

It's a friendly, vibrant, exciting place to live. We love the food which is simply incredible, with huge variety and low prices for eating out. We often eat out three times a day as the food is cheap and healthy. There are about 1000 food outlets within a 10-minute walk of our home. We especially love to eat in 'hawker centres' which are like open-air food courts. Each hawker stall has a small kitchen where they cook food from fresh ingredients, and only do a few dishes. We can choose anything from laksa, Korean fish to noodle soup to Hakka rice to Western food, Japanese, and Taiwanese!

**Dan**: It feels a very exotic place to live. It is multicultural with a strong underlying sense of tolerance of different cultures and faiths. The population is mainly people of Chinese, Tamil and Malay ethnicity but everyone seems to revel in the diversity and be well integrated. The place seems well run and we love the very real sense of optimism which a lot of people there enjoy. And when you think that this thriving metropolitan city state has arisen from what only 50-60 years ago was very much a third world country it's clear that it really has been a huge success story. Their history and politics are interesting. Much credit for Singapore's success must go to the founding father Lee Kuan Lew whose vision was for a country which would earn its place at the top economically through hard work and discipline. And some rather profitable shipping lanes!

**Ed**: My understanding was of a harsh authoritarian regime with very tough laws. **Delia**: Yes, laws are strict but there is hardly any crime of corruption whatsoever. You must carry an ID card but you never feel oppressed or controlled by the state,

it's not like that in our experience. And it is a democracy with free elections and a political opposition, with full religious tolerance. It's also one of the safest countries in the world. You certainly feel very safe when you live and work there. For example, it's completely safe for a woman to walk out alone at night, and there is very little risk of theft. You can leave your phone and wallet on a table to reserve your place to eat in a hawker centre and then go off to find your food. No-one will take it!

**Ed**: What's the environment like? I have an impression of extensive high rise urban development. And how do you like the climate?

**Dan**: Yes, there is massive urban development, but it feels good. The architecture is fantastic. The majority of the population live in apartments in high rise blocks but there are fabulous city parks and the government are promoting a lot of new green development, so much so that despite living on the 16<sup>th</sup> floor we are woken by a cock crowing every morning in the park and we've even got geckos living in the flat! The government are actively trying to 'green' the city and achieve environmental sustainability. There are many wildlife nature reserves and the wildlife is fascinating with numerous snakes, colugo (nocturnal cat-sized mammals that can glide 200feet), monkeys and monitor lizards to name but a few. Climate-wise it's fantastic; 28-31 degrees Celsius year-round with 13hours of daylight thanks to being so close to the equator. December to January is the monsoon wet season. And the built environment is cleverly adapted to the climate with covered footways along streets a bit like shopping arcades which protect you from both sun and rain.

There is just so much about the place that we like. We'd recommend a visit!

**Ed**: Thanks Dan and Delia, Singapore sounds amazing, and what a contrast to living in a small cottage opposite the Radnor Arms in the relative quiet of Nunton. Please come back and see us again! And we certainly look forward to visiting one day.

# Recipe of the month

It's delicious, it's really easy & quick to make, it's warming for these cooler days & it's excellent served cold in summer, when it's known as Vichyssoise. It's Leek and Potato soup! You don't have to add milk or cream, simply substituting more stock instead. It goes hand in hand with our Plant of the Month, the leek, which you could easily grow yourself if you wanted. When the tiny black seeds are planted, leeks seedlings sprout up and then you move them and "puddle" these seedlings into your garden in early summer in nice neat rows. You don't need to do much more although it's best if you've added some compost to the soil first, & you'll need to water them from time to time when it's hot. They will gradually thicken up into proper leeks over the summer and will wait patiently in the ground until you harvest them a few at a time, all over the autumn and winter. Miraculous.

#### Ingredients for leek and potato soup

1 onion

50-75g butter or 2 tbspns olive oil

2 medium leeks, washed and sliced into 0.5cm lengths

225g potato, cut into small chunks

1.2litres vegetable or chicken stock, plus additional 120mls if not using the optional milk or cream

Black pepper and salt to your taste

#### Optional:

120mls cream, milk or crème fraiche (retain a little to make a nice swirl in the top of each serving if desired). Probably best to add this dairy part if you are making vichyssoise.

Chopped chives for garnish

#### Method

- 1. Chop and slowly fry the onion in butter or olive oil in a large, lidded pan until it is nearly transparent
- 2. Add the chopped leeks and a 2-3 tablespoons of water, bring up to the boil and put the lid on the pan and "sweat" the leeks over a low heat, stirring occasionally, for 5-10 mins until soft.
- 3. Meanwhile, boil the potatoes in the stock in a separate pan until just cooked. Conserving the stock, remove potatoes from the pan, and stir them in with the leeks
- 4. When the potatoes are coated with the oil or butter, add the stock, season well, and boil gently for 5 mins
- 5. Use a hand blender or just mash the leeks and potatoes together using a masher to make the soup as smooth as you like
- 6. Stir in the milk or cream or crème fraiche and heat through again, keeping just short of boiling.
- 7. Serve with crusty bread, making your swirl of cream on the top of the soup as a garnish along with some black pepper and finely chopped chives if you wish.



# Nunton Nuisance News- Horrid Housemoths

Over the years when hoovering the carpet in our house I've often found just an occasional moth case, especially near the edge of the carpet. They look like grains of rice and in a rather naïve way I always rather liked them. They sit amongst the dust in the see-through dust-collection container of my vacuum cleaner as a pleasing secret sign of my diligence. And if you take a look inside the rice grain, there's a soft little fellow within, having a squirm around to look for another mouthful of something nice to eat. Quite sweet really.

Such acceptable biodiversity in our homes is mirrored in the sharing of our gardens with a (nicely-limited) number of pests: I like to give them a bit of a habitat but it is most annoying when they outstay their welcome or indeed multiply selfishly, causing damage to my crops (or carpets) in their inexorable rise. I plant my French and runner beans with marigolds adjacent as a gentle suggestion to the blackfly that they shouldn't get any ideas that the beans are only for them; generally that works well so I don't even have to spray with diluted fairy liquid which is my next go-to. I find though that my local blackfly population have a particular predilection for broad beans and I have struggled more to persuade them to depart from these. I don't grow broad beans all that often, so in my pest quest I haven't ventured much beyond the use of detergent spray or removing the tasty growth tips once the beans are a reasonable size. I did once use an overly-strong spray of washing up detergent that cleared the blackfly but sadly also dissuaded the broad beans themselves from continuing to thrive on my patch.

But I digress from the housemoth. Occasional grain grubs are just about acceptable, but a swathe of moths is much more of a malady, especially when you move the chest of drawers to find the carpet completely chomped by the greedy grubs. Next stop, there'll be others in your prize cashmere jerseys (or your non-prize merino-mix ones, as mostly in my drawer). So faced with a flurry of fluttering wings, one has to man the action stations against the enemy incursion.

Mumsnet says hoover, hoover, hoover to get rid of moth eggs in the carpet & prevent them hatching into grubs, the main munching machinery of the moth lifecycle. Enthusiasm for this in our house wanes after a while and we chucked out the worst-infested carpet. Lavender spray or real lavender is said to help. We've also had some success from putting all textiles of natural fibre like wool, cotton and linen through a 48hour sojourn in the deep-freeze & then storing them in sealed bags or storage crates. Using moth indicator strips that attract the newly hatched males with pheromones helps both to see the extent of the problem and (as we read that it's possible the males may hatch a bit ahead of their mates) maybe to entice the chaps out of the way quickly, preventing them fertilising the fresher female hatchlings and initiating the next generation of moths. Otherwise it seems it's over to professional pest control. Pest tips welcomed please!



# Salisbury City Council joins county-wide community air quality project

Salisbury City Council is pleased to announce the installation of two new air quality sensors, at its Tollgate Road Depot and Bemerton Heath Centre sites, as part of a Wiltshire Council-led initiative.

Wiltshire Council's Wiltshire Community Air Network (WCAN) has launched a oneyear community air quality monitoring project to understand more about air pollution in Wiltshire by using low-cost PurpleAir Zen PM2.5 Air Quality sensors to measure local fine particulate matter (PM2.5) air pollution.

PM2.5 is a type of air pollution made up of tiny pieces of solids or liquids, each no larger than 2.5 micrometres. These particles can originate from both human activities, such as vehicle emissions, and natural sources, such as dust. Exposure to PM2.5 can increase the risk of health problems and have harmful effects on the environment.

There is currently limited local data about PM2.5 in Wiltshire. By hosting two sensors, Salisbury City Council is contributing to a county-wide effort to identify local PM2.5 pollution trends and hotspots and inform future strategy for air quality monitoring and pollution reduction. This work is directly in line with its own Environment Policy, which commits the City Council to working with partners to monitor and help improve air quality.

The air quality sensors provide real-time data on PM2.5 pollution levels, which members of the public will be able to access online at <a href="map.purpleair.com">map.purpleair.com</a>. Individuals and communities can use this data to learn more about their local air quality.

Cllr Paul Sample, said, "This project will help us understand more about PM2.5 air pollution in Salisbury and Wiltshire as a whole.

"Wiltshire Council have obtained 100 low-cost air quality sensors available to measure local PM2.5 air pollution. The data from the sensors will be analysed by scientists to help us understand local PM2.5 pollution trends and hotspots, as well as helping inform our future strategy for air quality monitoring.

"I'd like to thank Salisbury City Council for supporting this project. If you would like to take part, please get in touch. There are still some areas of the City where we have no data."

# **PCC Parish Column:**

#### Public Confidence in Wiltshire Police - Progress and Priorities

The latest ONS survey shows 58% of people in Wiltshire believe their police force does an excellent or good job — well above the national average of 49%, the highest in the South West and third highest in the country. Half feel Wiltshire Police deal effectively with local concerns, and 51% believe the Force works well with partners. I'm proud of this progress, but I'm acutely aware that this survey means 42% of the people reading this column still feel there is more work to do to earn their trust. That's a challenge I take seriously.

The Chief Constable has re-orientated the force to be outward-looking, with stronger community engagement and better communication. Neighbourhood teams now visit every domestic burglary, and the Wiltshire Police website allows residents to enter their postcode to see local crime data, meet their policing team, and make direct contact.

The Chief Constable and I have also tackled one of the biggest frustrations — slow 999 and 101 response times. Wiltshire Police has moved from the worst in the country to 16th out of 43 forces. That's a significant improvement, but it's happening against a backdrop of a £6.8 million budget cut this year. Wiltshire Police is doing more with less than almost any other force, but sustained progress will require fairer funding, and I fear this won't happen until the government changes the way it funds policing in this country.

Visibility remains a priority, but it's about more than seeing officers on the street — it's about being present where they can make the most difference. That means targeted patrols in areas where crime and anti-social behaviour are most prevalent, rapid deployment when incidents occur, and ensuring officers have the time and tools to engage meaningfully with residents. It's also about making sure the public knows how to reach their local teams and see the results of police action in their communities.

I've always believed that statistics are only part of the story and measuring public confidence goes much further than percentage ratings. It's about how people feel when they interact with us. For a victim, no crime is "minor" — it's deeply personal. Every victim deserves to be treated with respect, kept informed, and to feel their case matters. That's why your complaints come to my office first, ensuring they're addressed promptly and appropriately.

In an age where social media can fuel division and mistrust, we must be robustly impartial. There can be no two-tier policing — every person and every crime must be treated equally, without fear or favour.

These results show we're moving in the right direction — but trust is built daily. I will keep listening, keep pushing for resources, and keep working with our communities to deliver the policing you deserve.

The money raised helps us provide the very best care for thousands of patients and their families across the hospital. Registration for Walk for Wards 2026 is now open, and we hope the community will join us on July 5 at Wilton House."

This year's event surpassed the £150,051 raised in 2024 and the record-breaking £157,922 raised in 2023.
