The Weston Lighthouse Project, Southampton

As most of you know, each Lent (the four weeks running up to Easter) the churches in the Chalke Valley Benefice adopt a project to raise money for. By all supporting the same charity, we are able to send off a decent amount of money.

This year's charity is the Weston Lighthouse Project run by the Church Army on the Weston Housing Estate, Southampton (it was featured on a BBC South programme "Inside Out" last year).

The project helps people on one of the poorest estates in the whole country – there is a Lighthouse Larder (a foodbank), the Lighthouse Seedbed (they have 3 allotments) the Lighthouse Swap-shop where furniture and white goods can be redistributed, a Lunch Club, a Renovations Club where people can help each other redecorate their homes, a drop in Coffee Morning and the Lighthouse Dadspace which offers companionship and help to fathers bringing up children on their own. They have attracted volunteers from the estate to run these projects under the guidance of a project manager.

If your village is holding an event in aid of the Lighthouse Project, do go along to support these incredible people – you may even be lucky enough to hear Tim, who is in charge of the whole project, speak; he is truly inspirational. (See details above of the Lent Lunch in Coombe Bissett)

Cargo Boat Memories

Some 2 years ago our Charlton colleague, Denis Blake, reminisced in N&N about his long-held passion for railways – playing with the toy versions as well as watching the full-size Southern Railway steam trains on the track running close to Winchester. In particular he mentioned the wartime hospital trains which most of us will not have seen, but I have read a great deal about these ambulance trains which played an important role in the 1914-18 War carrying wounded back from the frontline Casualty Clearing Stations to the base hospitals in France.

I share a similar interest in railways, once having an uncle (GP in Shropshire) who was Divisional Surgeon to GWR and privileged on occasions to ride accompanied on the footplate of a steam loco hauling a passenger train northwards from Paddington. However as a boy it was his model train layout that fascinated me, taking up virtually all the top floor of the Georgian house with connecting holes and tunnels knocked through the solid walls. At the end of the war new rolling stock appeared in the guise of superb replicas of Continental locomotives – these having been acquired from war-torn Germany shortly before his demob. During these war years the model train set had remained unused and unkempt, covered in dustsheets which were ceremoniously removed on his return home.

My enthusiasm for railways was perhaps overshadowed by an interest in anything connected with the sea and shipping. These were the years long before containerisation when our Merchant fleet was still recovering from the war losses but nevertheless still managed to cover the world's oceans. Sadly many of these shipping companies have long since disappeared.

It was in March 63 years ago that I first boarded a freighter as the sole passenger. The SS "Rosedale Park" was berthed in Cardiff docks and was one of the thousands of Victory and Liberty ships built in the shipyards of N. America to replace the Allied losses from enemy action. 15 shipyards in the USA built no less than 2710 of these utility ships between 1941 and 1945. They were built to a standard design and with an average construction time of 42 days, although one shipyard was reported to have completed one of these vessels in 4 days and 16 hours.

"Rosedale Park", 7139 gross tonnage, had been built in 1944 by United Shipyards Ltd of Montreal for the Park Steamship Company, also of Montreal and set up as an arm of the Canadian Government to administer the movement of war supplies across the Atlantic. By the time that I stepped aboard the war was over and she was then managed by the Ministry of Transport and sailing under the Saint Line flag.

Powered by steam these Victory ships were no-frills basic cargo carriers. There were absolutely no luxuries aboard but in those days people were used to a more basic way of life. Having been met at Cardiff station by the shipping agent, I was first taken to the shipping offices to sign on the crew list as supernumerary before being taken down to the docks.

In those days Cardiff dockland was a bustling maze of wharfs, warehouses and railway lines – noisy and dirty. It was late afternoon and "Rosedale Park" was being coaled ready to sail next day. Not a sign of a crew member but there must have been someone aboard to show the new member the one and only spare cabin. Nowhere to get any food and no sign of life except the coaling gangs. And so it remained until next morning when gradually the captain and crew appeared. The ship's Master was Captain Arthur Riding who had been awarded an OBE in 1944 for the rescue of survivors from a torpedoed ship whilst commanding SS "Danby".

I was travelling to Freetown in Sierra Leone, west Africa, where my father was in the Colonial Medical Service and had negotiated a passage for me at the princely fare of £10 each way. There were few alternative options for a teenager as the normal scheduled mailboats were fully booked with government officials and air travel to that part of Africa was in its infancy and exorbitantly expensive.

Sailing out of dockland and into the Bristol Channel at noon the following day was the beginning of an unforgettable experience. One moment the ship is lifeless, next day it springs to life with crew bustling about, a daily routine taking shape and superstructure starting to look clean and shipshape.

Passing Lundy Island and heading south towards the Bay of Biscay at a steady 10 knots and finding one's sealegs. The ship was in water ballast ready to load iron ore in bulk at our African destination and she was therefore high in the water. Fortunately Biscay was kind on this occasion, unlike other freighter and ship voyages when we encountered the renowned storms, rolling swell and deep troughs.

One quickly settles into a rhythm aboard a cargo boat and much of my time outward bound was spent on the bridge with the junior watch-keeping officer during his morning stint, as well as doing odd jobs around the ship. Passed the Canaries in a turquoise calm sea with clear blue skies, whales off the starboard bow and either dolphins or porpoises diving in and out of our bow wave following us down the length of west Africa. One quickly learnt how to match the other crew members in drinking McEwans Export and how to counter the steady roll when at the dart board. The Lascar crew produced a curry each evening which was shared with anyone going aft to their messroom.

Fourteen days later, sailing into Freetown harbour at dawn with the sun about to rise above the heavily-forested mountain backdrop. A magical sight for the first time and one that I witnessed on many occasions in later years. And so disembarked by a rusty harbour master's launch whilst the ship went further up river to load iron ore at the Marampa Mines railhead at Pepel.

Six weeks later it was back onboard "Rosedale Park" to return home having skipped one round voyage.. As there was no spare cabin I found myself sharing with the 5th engineer above the noisy, vibrating engine room. Ship was fully loaded with iron ore once again for discharge in Middlesbrough, a 17-day voyage but by then one knew the daily routine and I kept myself busy with an oily rag cleaning bits of machinery.

I had not anticipated how quickly the ship becomes deserted on arrival at our final destination, but since the discharge wharf was surrounded by pubs and other attractions, clearly no time was to be wasted by the crew once we had Customs clearance. For me it was farewells all round and a taxi to the station.

There were a number of subsequent cargo boat trips to Africa and other parts of the world but this first experience of a working ship was to be remembered. After sailing under different company flags, "Rosedale Park" was purchased by Dah Lien Shipping Co, renamed "Shienfoon" and sadly broken up in Hong Kong in 1968.






