For the Anglican Church worldwide there were large issues to face. They have not resolved themselves and nor will they with any speed, but we have all had to think a lot more about where we stand, what are the unshakable pillars of our faith and how those are affected by current discussions. If we have been shaken out of ourselves a bit, all well and good. I read this quote from ‘Lord of the Rings’ recently: “ ‘I wish it need not have happened in my time,’ said Frodo. ‘So do I’ said Gandalf, ‘and so do all who live to see such times. But that is not for them to decide. All that we have to decide is what to do with the time that is given us.’”

As we step out into this New Year we too need to consider what to do with our time, our talents and our energies. Having spent time looking inwards at issues faced by the Church, New Year is a good time to focus outwards again. Something that the diocese is encouraging us to do is to be more aware of fairly traded goods. You may have read about the Trade Justice Movement and the active part which our diocese is taking in it’s promotion. The Wiltshire Fairtrade Directory was launched in October and can be found in Libraries and in churches. It tells us where we can find fairly traded goods and so help Third World producers to get a better deal. It may just be a matter of stopping for a moment as we reach out to the familiar packet on the Supermarket shelf and trying the Fairtrade item instead. As Gandalf says, we do have the freedom to decide! Any day of the year is a good time to shift gear, but the beginning of the year, when we are sitting indoors by the fire leafing through the gardening catalogues or about to start the book we were given for Christmas is perhaps the best moment to stop, reflect on and review the old and look forward to making some changes in the new.

If we all made one positive New Year’s resolution that then became a habit we could really make a difference in the world around us! But while we are looking towards making changes let’s remember that some things never change...the way we look out for one another in our villages, kindness and generosity of spirit, these things will always hold their value. Above all the love of God never changes; the Bible tells us that “New every morning is his faithfulness”. We may fall down on our resolutions, but God’s love is there to pick us up to start again with every new day! May 2004 be a good year for us all!
