Remembrance

Smokey bonfires heaped with damp leaves turned over with a fork and beginning to blaze. Itchy knitted pixy hood and belted coat against the cold. My father, or someone else's father, carefully following the instructions on those yellow and red cones or blue and white rockets and mothers handing us sparklers, much smaller than they are now, but one in each hand. These are my memories of the 5th of November. We did 'apple bobbing' at school and ate sooty sausages....never a great event but always fun. By the time our children came along the dangers of firework parties in the garden had been recognized and the local parks were used for huge bonfires and firework displays, a hog roast and a fairground. But still the cry was 'remember, remember'. Bonfire night may remind us of the burning of the 'guy' of the Gunpowder Plot in 1605, but it is mostly buried in the mists of time.

The more significant remembering in November is the sacrifice of those who gave their lives in war. The Royal British Legion leaflet this year reminds us that "The sacrifice goes on..." It tells of lives that are radically changed by the effects of war, young men and women re-establishing their lives in a new way as the result of bomb blasts.

Sir John Millais painted a haunting picture of four girls piling leaves on a bonfire in the twilight. Two are gazing into the fire, maybe recalling those leaves in the days of summer? The other two are looking out into the distance, what will be in the coming year? The genesis of this picture is thought to be a remark made by Millais to his friend Holman Hunt, "Is there any sensation more delicious than that awakened by the odour of burning leaves? To me nothing brings back sweeter memories of the days that are gone..." The leaves fall as the poppy leaves will fall at the Remembrance service on the eve of Remembrance Day but like the Millais painting we must in our remembering be looking forward as well as back. It was Camus who said "The greatest fidelity to the past is to give everything to the present." Every day in the present is a challenge for those fighting their way back from injury. Every day for us is an opportunity to give ourselves to the present moment. We can have confidence that underneath us are the 'everlasting arms' of the God who loves us. At the end of his poem 'Autumn', Rainer Maria Rilke puts it like this:

"We are all falling. This hand's falling too -
all have this falling-sickness none withstands.
And yet there's One whose gently-holding hands
this universal falling can't fall through."
