Holidays - or the closed season

From a Church point of view August is often regarded as a supreme non-event. It is, after all the holiday season – Universities and Schools are enjoying the long vacation – Parliament is in recess – many shops, offices and factories are either short staffed or closed down for a period – unlike here in the Chalke Valley where farmers are exceptionally busy working long hours to get the harvest in. As congregations too are often depleted, there is unfortunately an idea that nothing of importance happens in August, and that the month is a slumbering, docile – warm, we hope – resting space between Trinity and Harvest Festival. However, this is most certainly not the case. August contains a rich variety of Festivals and Commemorations of great significance, although many of them are generally ignored. I have chosen just the four major festivals out of the many in the calendar.

The month begins with **Lammas Day**, the first herald of the harvest – especially important in a rural area like ours. It was a day on which, in the middle ages, the bread used at Holy Communion was the first loaf made from newly harvested wheat. Lammas means ‘loaf festival’ taken from the old English ‘*hlaf*’, loaf and ‘*maesse*’ festival. Most churches today would find 1st August a most inconvenient day on which to hold Harvest Festival – (and on the day of writing – 16th – I have yet to see a combine).

6th August is **The Transfiguration of our Lord**. The story of the Transfiguration of Jesus on the mount is told in the Gospels of Ss. Matthew, Mark and Luke, and Peter refers to it in his Second Epistle. Each time it is made clear that God’s salvation is for everyone and Jesus is the one who brings that salvation. The testimony of the law and the prophets to Jesus are given by the presence of Moses and Elijah and the event also prefigures the resurrection, giving a foretaste of the life of glory.

The Festival of **The Blessed Virgin Mary** is celebrated on 15th August and is the Patronal Festival of our three churches at Odstock, Homington and Alvediston. When an angel told Mary she was to be the bearer of the Son of God, her reply, ‘Let it be to me according to your word’ encapsulated her obedience to God and her reverence for His Word. This day is now celebrated as the major feast of Mary throughout most of Christendom.

Bartholomew the Apostle is celebrated on 24th August – one of Jesus’ men about whom we know comparatively little. It has always been assumed that Bartholomew is the same as Nathaniel though it is not a certainty. The gospels speak of Philip bringing Nathaniel to Jesus and calling him an ‘Israelite worthy of the name’ He is also present beside the Sea of Galilee at the resurrection. Although he seems initially a somewhat cynical man, he recognises Jesus for who he is and proclaims him as Son of God.

But there is much also to ponder on from the history of our own times. 4th August commemorates the outbreak of war in 1914 –and what a holocaust that turned out to be with the deaths of over three million people. And since that day the world has not been the same. August 1939 saw the events throughout Europe that presaged the Second World War. 6th August remembers the dropping of the first atom bomb on Hiroshima in 1945. In 1946 I stood among the ruins of that city and saw the complete devastation of a once proud city – and what was sown that day was harvested for years afterwards as the inhabitants succumbed to radiation. 8th August saw another atom bomb fall on Nagasaki, obliterating the largest Christian Cathedral in the East. Thirty five years ago in August 1969 saw the outbreak of violence in Northern Ireland.

Then again, in peacetime between the wars and post-war, the newspapers referred to August as the ‘silly season’ because the absence of news made any evidence of light-heartedness good enough news to print. But our prayer must always be for the Kingdom of God on earth. It is often when the vagaries of social movement are at their maximum that the still small voice of the Holy Spirit can be heard most clearly. In the midst of all the conflicts in the Middle East at this present time let us pray for ‘that peace’ which only Jesus can give. The challenge of our faith is not to let go but to show others the joy and absolute fulfilment of being a follower of Christ.

Plans are well underway for another weekend for the whole Benefice on similar lines to that held in Broad Chalke in March 2002. This time it will be at Coombe Bissett, using the Church, Fellowship Chapel, School and Village Hall, and aims to draw together people of wide interests and outlooks.

The programme will include thought-provoking seminars, good food, worship and a chance to meet new people in the valley.

There will be one main Sunday Morning Service plus two 8am Holy Communions elsewhere in the Benefice and then an ecumenical evening at the URC Chapel in Broad Chalke.
